This Week in Church School

Today's lesson: Eucharist

Questions to ask/review:

- What does the word Eucharist mean?
- Why do we celebrate the Eucharist?
- Why are bread and wine used?
- Do they truly become His body and blood or only a symbol?
- How do they become His body and blood?
- How should we prepare to receive the Eucharist?
- What can happen if they are taken unworthily?

Suggested Activities at home:

- Read, discuss, and compare St. Basil's and St. John's Anaphora prayers.
- As a family, pray some communion preparatory prayers together before liturgy.

Prayer: Lord, bless us with the miracle of Your Body and Blood, this week and every week.

Hymns and Readings for Sunday, March 24

Tone 1 Troparion(Resurrection)When the stone had been sealed by the Jews,
while the soldiers were guarding Thy most pure
body,

Thou didst <u>rise</u> on the third day, O <u>Sa</u>vior, granting <u>life</u> to the world.

- The <u>pow</u>ers of heaven therefore cried to Thee, O <u>Giv</u>er of Life:
- "Glory to Thy Resur<u>rec</u>tion, O Christ!
- <u>Glory to Thy Kingdom!//</u>
- Glory to Thy dispensation, O Thou Who <u>lov</u>est mankind!"

Tone 2 Troparion(Sunday of Orthodoxy)

We <u>ven</u>erate Thy most pure image, O <u>Good</u> One; and ask forgiveness of our transgressions, O Christ our God.

- Of Thine own <u>will</u> Thou wast pleased to ascend the <u>Cross</u> in the flesh
- and deliver Thy creatures from bondage to the <u>En</u>emy.
- <u>There</u>fore with thankfulness we cry a<u>loud</u> to Thee:

"Thou hast filled all with joy, O our <u>Sav</u>ior,// by <u>coming to save</u> the world."

Tone 4 Troparion (Forefeast)

Today is the prelude of joy for the <u>u</u>niverse! Let us anticipate the feast and celebrate with exul<u>ta</u>tion:

- Gabriel is on his way to announce the glad tidings to the <u>Vir</u>gin;
- he is ready to cry out in fear and <u>won</u>der:// "Rejoice, O Full of Grace, the <u>Lord</u> is with thee!"

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit.

Tone 8 Kontakion(Sunday of Orthodoxy)No one could describethe Word of the Father;

- but when He took <u>flesh</u> from <u>thee</u>, O Theotokos, He accepted to <u>be</u> described,
- and restored the <u>fal</u>len <u>im</u>age to its former state by uniting it to divine <u>beau</u>ty.//
- We confess and pro<u>claim</u> our sal<u>va</u>tion in words and <u>im</u>ages.

Now and ever and unto ages of ages. Amen.

Tone 8 Kontakion (Forefeast)

- Thou art the be<u>gin</u>ning of sal<u>va</u>tion for all of us on earth, Virgin <u>Mo</u>ther of God.
- For the great Arch<u>ang</u>el <u>Gab</u>riel, God's minister, was sent from heaven to stand before thee to <u>bring</u> thee joy://
- Therefore, we all <u>cry</u> to <u>thee</u>: "Rejoice, O un<u>wed</u>ded Bride!"

Tone 4 Prokeimenon *(Song of the Fathers)* Blessed art Thou, O Lord God of our fathers, / and praised and glorified is Thy Name forever! *(Song of the three Holy Children, v. 3)*

Epistle of the Sunday (Heb 11:24-26; 32-12:2)

By faith Moses, when he became of age, refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter, choosing rather to suffer affliction with the people of God than to enjoy the passing pleasures of sin, esteeming the reproach of Christ greater riches than the treasures in Egypt; for he looked to the reward.

And what more shall I say? For the time would fail me to tell of Gideon and Barak and Samson and Jephthah, also of David and Samuel and the prophets: who through faith subdued kingdoms, worked righteousness, obtained promises, stopped the mouths of lions, quenched the violence of fire, escaped the edge of the sword, out of weakness were made strong, became valiant in battle, turned to flight the armies of the aliens. Women received their dead raised to life again.

Others were tortured, not accepting deliverance, that they might obtain a better resurrection. Still others had trial of mockings and scourgings, yes, and of chains and imprisonment. They were stoned, they were sawn in two, were tempted, were slain with the sword. They wandered about in sheepskins and goatskins, being destitute, afflicted, tormented of whom the world was not worthy. They wandered in deserts and mountains, in dens and caves of the earth.

And all these, having obtained a good testimony through faith, did not receive the promise, God having provided something better for us, that they should not be made perfect apart from us.

Therefore we also, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which so easily ensnares us, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, looking unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith, who for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and has sat down at the right hand of the throne of God.

Gospel of the Sunday (John 1:43-51)

The following day Jesus wanted to go to Galilee, and He found Philip and said to him, "Follow Me." Now Philip was from Bethsaida, the city of Andrew and Peter. Philip found Nathanael and said to him, "We have found Him of whom Moses in the law, and also the prophets, wrote— Jesus of Nazareth, the son of Joseph."

And Nathanael said to him, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?"

Philip said to him, "Come and see."

Jesus saw Nathanael coming toward Him, and said of him, "Behold, an Israelite indeed, in whom is no deceit!"

Nathanael said to Him, "How do You know me?"

Jesus answered and said to him, "Before Philip called you, when you were under the fig tree, I saw you."

Nathanael answered and said to Him, "Rabbi, You are the Son of God! You are the King of Israel!"

Jesus answered and said to him, "Because I said to you, 'I saw you under the fig tree,' do you believe? You will see greater things than these." And He said to him, "Most assuredly, I say to you, hereafter you shall see heaven open, and the angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of Man."
